fficially established in 1965, the Kent State University Press has been recognized for publishing in a wide range of subject areas for both specialist and general audiences. Our first publication, *Renaissance Humanism*, 1300–1550 by Frederick B. Artz (1966), established our robust list in literary criticism. Additionally, current areas of publication include regional and Rust Belt studies, sports history, fashion history, true crime, and US history, and many books and series have benefited from fruitful collaborations within and outside of Kent State University.

Over the past 60 years, these relationships have expanded and thrived. To give but a couple examples, our long-standing partnership with the Wick Poetry Center has led to numerous ongoing projects, such as the annual Stan and Tom Wick Poetry Prize, through which the winner's first full-length poetry collection is published by the University Press. Since 2017, we have also partnered with the Costume Society of America to publish works about fashion history, conservation, and more. These essential partnerships have helped amplify the distinct voices of our authors while showcasing key areas of distinction for the University. And as a member of the Association of University Presses, we're among a select group of university-sponsored presses whose outstanding



and place-based programs help make publishing more diverse and vital.

Each book we publish is crafted through the collective effort of our staff as it is shepherded through the publishing process: acquisitions, editorial, design and

production, and marketing. Many of our books have received awards and attention from leading outlets around the nation and the world, including PEN America and PBS NewsHour. In 2024, we began highlighting our achievements and sharing updates on our blog, The Book Starts Here (KentStateBooks.wordpress.com).

As we reflect on the past 60 years, we remain committed to our vision: to collaborate with stakeholders and share compelling stories and scholarship that have enduring significance books that matter.

Learning from one Rust Belt city's postindustrial transition

While Pittsburgh is sometimes held up as a successful example of urban reinvention in the era after heavy industry (think "eds and meds"), its transition away from steel has in fact been uneven and contested. Christopher P. Briem grew up in the city's Bloomfield and South Side neighborhoods watching that process. Now a regional economist at the University of Pittsburgh, he has spent many years working in multiple registers to document economic change—through his academic research, as a public authority consulted nationally when Pittsburgh is in the news, and as a spirited participant in popular debates about what is still called the Steel City.

Beyond Steel

Pittsburgh and the Economics of Transformation

Beyond Steel collects Briem's encyclopedic knowledge of the city during and after its steelmaking heyday. Briem tells stories about the boundary between resilience and obstinacy, particularly as manifested in the ultimately unsuccessful pursuit of economic development through smokestack chasing. "Long before the 1980s arrived," he writes, "future prospects for Greater Pittsburgh had decoupled from the prospects of the American steel industry, a reality that to this day remains difficult to accept for a region so long identified with the seemingly monolithic industry." At once optimistic and cautious, Beyond Steel should help inform debates about how communities across the Rust Belt navigate issues of dynamism, heritage, and deindustrialization.

American Fashion Through Elizabeth and William Phelps

Rebecca Jumper Matheson

One couple's journey to crafting a new design identity in midcentury America

Long before the fashion industry formally addressed questions of sustainability and advocated for "slow fashion," William and Elizabeth Phelps, a husband-and-wife design duo, were already working to create handcrafted leathergoods and functional women's sportswear that could be worn for decades. Active from the 1940s to the late 1960s, Phelps Associates quickly won acclaim and found commercial success, attracting a broad clientele and becoming known for quality, utility, and craftsmanship.

Using vintage metal insignia and hardware, often military surplus, the Phelpses designed bags and belts that answered the need for American-made luxury goods during and after World War II. In the postwar period, the Phelpses experimented with new methods of production and branched into ready-towear fashion. Meanwhile, the pair worked to revive artisan workshops, emphasized fostering positive work environments for their employees, and offered employment opportunities for injured veterans.

Artisans and Designers is the first in-depth analysis of the Phelpses' partnership, their often-overlooked contributions to the fashion industry, and their forward-thinking business practices. Rebecca Jumper Matheson draws on their pieces to connect their work to larger conversations about sustainable fashion, consumerism, industrialization practices, and the intersection of art with American identity during and after World War II. The result is an engagingly written, richly illustrated account of a brand committed to creating classic pieces that have stood the test of time.

The Deep Blue of Neptune

The Deep Blue of Neptune is a striking, meditative collection of poems by Terry Belew, which reminds readers of the necessity of empathy in the midst of uncertain and unsettling times. Set against a rural backdrop, Belew's poems reside in the everyday—driving on gravel backroads, roaming the aisles of Walmart, and doomscrolling on a smart phone—to highlight the contradictory qualities of existence.

Belew utilizes a variety of forms, familiar and invented, including free verse, sonnets, sestinas, and "wish lists," to explore his speakers' inner lives. Often haunted by violence, from car crashes to gunshots, these poems are a reflection of how people must navigate the bleak landscape of the digital age. *The Deep Blue of Neptune* is a masterfully crafted debut, blending lyricism with wry humor to address the complexities of our relationships with other people, with nature, and with ourselves.

The USAID Approach

Galeeb Kachra

How USAID's work in Kenya can inform broader foreign policy

In Peace and Security in Kenya: The USAID Approach, Galeeb Kachra examines the involvement of the US Agency for International Development (USAID) in Kenya following the postelection violence in late 2007 and early 2008 that left the country on the brink of civil war. Through USAID's Office of Transition Initiatives, Kachra oversaw the Kenya Transition Initiative, which helped Kenyans establish a renewed judiciary, implement a new constitution, and grapple with long-standing land issues. As a country central to American foreign policy in Africa, Kachra argues, efforts to foster peace, reconciliation, and democratic political reform there had real benefits to US security objectives.

In examining USAID's role in a critical period in Kenyan history and drawing on his firsthand experiences, Kachra contends that "peace and security," a phrase commonly used throughout American government documents and foreign policy strategies, is ill-defined and does not account for how overseas development interventions contribute to American national security objectives. Arguing against compartmentalization and narrow understandings of what constitutes peace and security work, Kachra instead urges specialists and policymakers to adopt a broader, more holistic approach when considering strategic objectives. An insightful examination by a career development expert, Peace and Security in Kenya offers a fresh approach at a significant time in global affairs.

Tom Batiuk showcases his roots as the Funkyverse expands

In this latest volume, Tom Batiuk continues to explore the roots of comic books and newspaper comic strips and provides unique insight into the evolution of his own creative process. Beginning five years after the strip's most recent time-jump, the Funky gang are now in their late forties and raising teenagers of their own. Batiuk continues the Starbuck Jones storyline from the previous volume, as Holly searches for the final five issues of the comic book to send to Cory in Afghanistan. Elsewhere, there is a memorable class reunion, the character of Mason Jarr is introduced, and the cast decamps to Hollywood as Lisa's Story is about to be adapted into a movie.

TOM BATIUK is a graduate of Kent State University. His celebrated *Funky Winkerbean* comic strip concluded its 50-year run on December 31, 2022. Its spin-off, *Crankshaft*, is still carried in almost 500 newspapers throughout the United States. Batiuk was a finalist in the cartooning category of the 2008 Pulitzer Prize awards for the series of daily comic strips that chronicled the death of longtime character Lisa Moore, which were collected in the *Lisa's Legacy Trilogy*. His *Funky Winkerbean* series and *Roses in December* were finalists for the 2016 Eisner Awards.
